Whereas the Oregon Legislature enacted, and the Governor signed, a law in the 2016 legislative session, 2016 Oregon Laws Chapter 56 (Senate Bill 1513), which authorizes a county through appropriate enactment to provide a partial property tax exemption for the homestead of surviving spouses of certain public safety officers killed in the line of duty; and

Whereas the new law further defines public safety officers as being fire service professionals, police officers and reserve officers as those positions are defined in ORS 181A.355; defines "homestead" and "surviving spouse; allows the exemption for up to \$250,000 of assessed value for the homestead owned and occupied by the surviving spouse; and further defines conditions and qualifications for applying for and granting the property tax exemption; and

Whereas the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners desires to enact a resolution as authorized by law to allow this exemption for qualified applicants.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Commissioners does resolve that:

1. Lincoln County authorizes a property tax exemption of up to \$250,000 of assessed value to all qualifying applicants for the homestead of surviving spouses of certain public safety officers killed in the line of duty in accordance with 2016 Oregon Laws Chapter 56 (Senate Bill 1513).
2. Applicants must meet all conditions and requirements of 2016 Oregon Laws Chapter 56 (Senate Bill 1513).
3. Copies of this Resolution be provided to Lincoln County Assessor Joe Davidson and to Lincoln County Counsel Wayne Belmont.

11 Findings:

12 WHEREAS, ORS 475B.345(2) provides in part that a governing body of a county may
13 adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters that imposes a tax or fee on the sale of marijuana
14 items sold in the unincorporated area subject to the jurisdiction of a county by a person that holds
15 a license under ORS 475B.110 (marijuana retailer); and

16 WHEREAS, ORS 475B.345(4) limits the tax or fee referenced above to 3%; and

17 WHEREAS, ORS 475B.310(3) indicates that if a governing body of a county adopts an
18 ordinance as referenced above, the governing body shall refer the measure of the ordinance to the
19 electors of the county for approval at the next statewide general election; and

20 WHEREAS, the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners wants to impose a tax on the
21 sale of marijuana items by a marijuana retailer in the unincorporated area subject to the
22 jurisdiction of the county.

23 The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners ordains as follows:

24 SECTION 1.

25 Provided that this ordinance is approved by electors of Lincoln County on November 8,
26 2016, Chapter 5 of the Lincoln County Code (LCC) is amended by adding the following sections
27 as outlined below.

28 **5.305 Definitions**

29 **As used in LCC 5.305 to 5.315, unless the context requires otherwise:**

30 **(1) “Marijuana items” has the meaning given that term in ORS 475B.015(16).**
31

1 **(2) “Marijuana retailer” means a person who sells marijuana items to a**
2 **consumer in this state.**

3
4 **(3) “Retail sale price” means the price paid for a marijuana item, excluding tax,**
5 **to a marijuana retailer by or on behalf of a consumer of the marijuana item.**

6 **5.310 Tax Imposed**

7 **As described in ORS 475B.345, Lincoln County hereby imposes a tax of 3 percent**
8 **on the retail sale price of marijuana items by a marijuana retailer in the unincorporated**
9 **area of Lincoln County.**

10 **5.315 Collection**

11 **The tax shall be collected at the point of sale of a marijuana item by a marijuana**
12 **retailer at the time at which the retail sale occurs and remitted by each marijuana retailer**
13 **that engages in the retail sale of marijuana items.**

14 SECTION 2.

15 This ordinance shall be referred to the electors of Lincoln County at the next statewide
16 general election on Tuesday, November 8, 2016.

17 SECTION 3.

18 This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon certification of the election results if
19 approved by the electors of Lincoln County at the election of November 8, 2016.

8 WHEREAS, ORS 475B.345 provides that a county governing body may adopt an ordinance to be
9 referred to the voters that imposes up to a three percent tax or fee on the sale of marijuana items in
10 the unincorporated area of the county; and

11 WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners adopted Ordinance No. _____, which
12 imposes a tax of three percent on the sale of marijuana items by a marijuana retailer in the
13 unincorporated areas of the county;

14 NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AND
15 ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

- 16 1. A measure election is hereby called for the purpose of submitting to the electors of
17 Lincoln County a measure imposing a three percent tax on the sale of marijuana items
18 by a marijuana retailer in the unincorporated areas of the county, a copy of which is
19 attached hereto as “Exhibit 1”, and incorporated by reference.
20
- 21 2. This measure election shall be held in Lincoln County on November 8, 2016, for the
22 next general election. As required by ORS 254.465, the measure election shall be
23 conducted by mail by the Lincoln County Clerk, according to the procedures adopted by
24 the Oregon Secretary of State.
25
- 26 3. The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners authorizes County Counsel to act on
27 behalf of the county and to take such further action as is necessary to carry out the intent
28 and purposes set forth herein, in compliance with the applicable provisions of the law.
29
- 30 4. The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the ballot title for the
31 measure, which is referenced in 1) above, and which is attached hereto as “Exhibit 1”,
32 and incorporated by reference. County Counsel is authorized to deposit the ballot title
33 with the County Clerk within the times set by law. County Counsel is authorized to
34 make minor adjustments to the ballot title upon review with the County Clerk.

- 1 5. Upon receiving the ballot title for this measure, the County Clerk shall publish in the
2 next available edition of a newspaper of general circulation in the county a notice of
3 receipt of the ballot title, including notice that an elector may file a petition for review
4 of the ballot title.
5
6 6. The explanatory statement for this measure, which is attached hereto as “Exhibit 2”, and
7 incorporated by reference, is hereby approved. County Counsel is authorized to make
8 minor adjustments to the explanatory statement upon review with the County Clerk.
9
10 7. The Notice of Measure Election shall be delivered to the County Clerk for Lincoln
11 County for inclusion on the ballot for the November 8, 2016 election.
12
13 8. This resolution is effective upon its adoption.

CAPTION

Imposes county tax on marijuana retailer’s sale of marijuana items

QUESTION

Shall Lincoln County impose three percent tax on the sale of retail marijuana items in unincorporated areas of the county?

SUMMARY

Under state law, a county governing body may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters of the county imposing up to a three percent tax or fee on the sale of retail marijuana items in unincorporated areas of the of the county by a state licensed marijuana retailer. The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners adopted Ordinance No. _____ on August _____, 2016, which imposes a three percent tax on the sale of marijuana items by a marijuana retailer and referring the ordinance to the voters at the General Election to be held on November 8, 2016.

Approval of this measure would impose a three percent tax on the sale of marijuana items in the unincorporated areas of the county by a state licensed marijuana retailer. The tax would be collected at the point of sale and remitted by the marijuana retailer.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Approval of this measure would impose a three percent tax on the sale of marijuana items by a marijuana retailer within the unincorporated areas of Lincoln County. If approved the estimated revenues from this tax are unknown. There are no restrictions on how the county may use the revenues generated by this tax.

Under Measure 91, adopted by Oregon voters in November of 2014, codified in ORS Chapter 475B and amended by the Legislature in 2015 and 2016, the Oregon Liquor Control Commission must license the retail sale of recreational marijuana. ORS 475B.345 provides that a county governing body may adopt an ordinance imposing up to a three percent tax on the sale of marijuana items (which include marijuana concentrates, extracts, edibles, and other products intended for human consumption and use) by retail licensees in the unincorporated areas of the county, but the ordinance must be referred to the county voters at a statewide general election. The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners has adopted an ordinance imposing a three percent tax on the sale of marijuana items by a retail licensee in the unincorporated areas of the county, and as a result, has referred this measure to the county voters.

10 WHEREAS Lincoln County and the City of Newport entered into a Memorandum of
11 Agreement, dated April 23, 2014 recorded by Board of Commissioners' Order No. 4-14-108,
12 setting general timelines and procedures for the potential transfer of jurisdiction and
13 maintenance responsibility for Big Creek Road, County Road # 402 from the County to the
14 City; and

15 WHEREAS the City has completed the necessary pre-transfer process of amending the
16 Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) and annexing certain properties adjacent to the Road into the
17 City, City of Newport Ordinance # 2050 dated May 6, 2013 and Lincoln County Ordinance
18 #476 dated April 16, 2014 (UGB Amendment) and City of Newport Ordinance # 2095 dated
19 May 2, 2016 (Annexation); and

20 WHEREAS the County completed the necessary pre-transfer process of legalizing the
21 location of the Road under ORS Chapter 368, initiated by Board of Commissioners' Order No.
22 5-15-127 dated May 20, 2015 and completed and finalized by Board of Commissioners' Order
23 No. 9-15-228 dated September 2, 2015; and

24 WHEREAS after further discussions between County and City staffs the
25 recommendations are to transfer the Road in its current condition (no additional work) and
26 have the city assume maintenance responsibility immediately upon transfer; and

1 WHEREAS transfer can be initiated in accordance with ORS 373.270. The City of
2 Newport will consider adoption of appropriate municipal legislation requesting surrender of
3 the Road under ORS 373.270(6);

4 **IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:**

5 (1) Proceedings are initiated to transfer jurisdiction in accordance with ORS 373.270
6 to the City of Newport over that portion of Big Creek County Road, County Road # 402
7 described in Exhibit "A".

8 (2) A public hearing on this matter shall be conducted by the Board of
9 Commissioners at a regularly scheduled Board meeting.

10 (4) The County shall cause notice of the hearing to be posted or published in
11 accordance with ORS 373.270(2).

2016 Program of Work

Vegetation and Wildlife Habitat Management

Landscape-scale Restoration Project Planning

Schooner-Rock Restoration Project Planning

- *Location:* East of Lincoln City in the Schooner and Rock Creek basins.
- *Purpose:* Restoration thinning in young managed stands (25 to 60 years old) to promote development of late successional forest, snag and down wood creation in managed and natural stands, road reconstruction and decommissioning, large wood additions to streams.
- *Timeline:* Comment period in late April, decision this fall.

Sand Lake Restoration Project Planning

- *Location:* East of Hwy. 101, West of Cape Lookout and Cape Meyers
- *Purpose:* Restoration thinning in young managed stands (30 to 60 years old) to promote development of late successional forest, snag and down wood creation in managed and natural stands, road reconstruction and decommissioning, large wood additions to streams.
- *Timeline:* Project planning beginning Spring 2016, public scoping expected early 2017

Vegetation Management Projects

Invasive Plant Treatment

- *Location and Purpose:* Likely to treat knotweed in the vicinity of the Salmon River estuary and European beachgrass in the Sand Lake Research Natural Area with herbicides. District-wide manual and mechanical treatments focused on more wide-spread species (Scot's broom, Himalayan blackberry, foxglove, ox-eye daisy, tansy ragwort, etc.).
- *Timeline:* Ongoing.

Misc. Silviculture Projects

- Preparing and administering contracts for planting, vexar tubing maintenance and release (from shrub competition) of recently planted trees. Trees are being planted in gaps and open canopy areas of commercially thinned stands for species diversity.
- Preparing and administering firewood sales along roads for road maintenance and to provide firewood for local communities.
- Non-commercial thinning and possibly some pruning for control of bear damage.

Timber Sales

- Sold contracts being administered are Huck Thin, Hebo Heli Thin, Cloverdale Thin, Buzzard Thin, Horn Thin, Bixby Thin, and Panther Thin Stewardship. (~ 1,738 acres and 33,943 MBF).
- Sales offered this year: 1432 Thin, South Lake Stewardship and Farmer Thin

Coastal Meadows and Oregon Silverspot Butterfly

Forest-wide Coastal Meadow Restoration Strategy.

- *Location:* Forest-wide, but local locations include Cascade Head and Mount Hebo.

USDA Forest Service is an equal opportunity provider and employer.



- *Purpose:* Develop a strategy for implementing restoration actions aimed at developing healthy native coastal meadows which support the critically threatened Oregon Silverspot butterfly as well as a diverse community of native plants and animals.
- *Timeline:* NEPA for site-specific restoration plans to be initiated in FY 17.

Meadow Maintenance Planning and Implementation

- *Location:* Mt. Hebo, Salmon River area, other locations throughout the District
- *Purpose:* Ongoing maintenance of open meadows to provide habitat for Oregon silverspot butterfly, elk, and other wildlife. Limit encroachment from trees and reduce competition between native vegetation and invasive non-native plants.
- *Timeline:* NEPA complete, implementation this summer and ongoing

Oregon silverspot butterfly habitat restoration and maintenance

- *Location:* Existing occupied habitat on Mt. Hebo
- *Purpose:* Maintain the quality of existing occupied habitat by treating encroaching vegetation and invasive plants and aiding establishment of violets and nectar plants.
- *Timeline:* Implementation in some areas is planned for this summer, and is ongoing

Aquatic Restoration Projects

North Creek Fish Passage

- *Location:* Drift Creek (Siletz) watershed, Lincoln Co.
- *Purpose:* Replace an undersized, failing culvert on North Creek to improve passage for coho, winter steelhead, Fall Chinook, cutthroat trout, and pacific lamprey.
- *Timeline:* Planned to have design complete in 2016 and implement project in 2018.

Nestucca Watershed Nutrient Enhancement

- *Location:* Locations throughout the District.
- *Purpose:* Place salmon and/or steelhead carcasses from ODFW fish hatcheries in the upper watershed reaches near pools or debris jams in order to retain the marine derived nutrients in the ecosystem.
- *Timeline:* January 2016 to February 2023, during spawning season each year.

Salmon SuperHwy Projects

Moon Creek Culvert Replacement

- *Location:* Moon Creek is tributary of the Nestucca River. Moon Creek road is a county road and is approximately 4 miles east of the community of Beaver in Tillamook County.
- *Purpose:* Replace a failing culvert on Moon Creek to restore fish passage for Steelhead and Cutthroat trout as well as restore the natural hydraulic regime.
- *Timeline:* Planned to be implemented in the summer of 2016.

Boulder Creek Culvert Replacement

- *Location:* Boulder Creek, a tributary to the Nestucca River, on Blankenship Road off of Blaine Road (Hwy 858), 5 miles east of the community of Beaver in Tillamook County.
- *Purpose:* Replace a failing undersized culvert with a bridge to accommodate natural stream processes and restore fish passage for Coho, Chinook, Steelhead, Cutthroat trout, and Pacific Lamprey.
- *Timeline:* Planned to be implemented in 2017.

Recreation and Lands Projects

Cascade Head Information and Education Project

- *Location:* Along Fraser Road within the boundaries of Cascade Head Scenic-Research Area
- *Purpose:* Construction of interpretative day use facility that will tell the story of CHSRA by providing educational and scientific information to the public. Project also includes a vault toilet, parking for up to ten passenger vehicles and two over-length vehicles, and a short walking trail adjacent to Fraser Road that ends at an overlook of the estuary.
- *Timeline:* Implementation this year.

Rocky Bend and Castle Rock Campground Repurposing

- *Location:* Rocky Bend campground is located adjacent to the Nestucca River and Castle Rock Campground is adjacent to Three Rivers River.
- *Purpose:* Gating both locations to allow better management. Will be working with partners to correct issues.
- *Timeline:* Planning to be completed this year, implementation in 2016.

Hebo Lake Picnic Shelter Improvement Project

- *Location:* Hebo Lake Campground
- *Purpose:* The existing picnic shelter will have structure restoration done with wood salvaged from hazard trees.
- *Timeline:* Implementation in summer 2016.

Special Uses

- Issuance of new special use authorizations and reauthorizations of existing special uses that include utility easements, recreational events, operation of organizational camps, and road right of ways.
- NEPA analysis and authorization of new road construction to access private lands adjacent to National Forest System lands.

Road Maintenance Activities

- District-wide road repair and maintenance on various timber sale, stewardship, and road maintenance contracts including storm damage mitigation.


