WHEREAS, recovery from substance use disorders is possible through a variety of treatment resources and recovery support programs; and

WHEREAS, in Oregon, people with substance abuse issues and/or mental health conditions die 34.5 years earlier than the general population; and

WHEREAS, thousands of people across the United States are living happy, healthy and productive lives in recovery; and

WHEREAS, stress can contribute to substance use disorders, and finding a positive outlet for dealing with stress is crucial as people continue to face stressful situations in their lives; and

WHEREAS, nearly a quarter of U.S. adults said they were under extreme stress in 2015, up from 18 percent the year before. Average stress levels in the U.S. rose from 4.9 in 2014 to 5.1 on a 10- point stress scale. (American Psychological Association, Executive Report, March 10, 2016); and

WHEREAS, Lincoln County residents report experiencing 4.2 poor mental health days in a month, compared with the state average of 3.3 days. Additionally, 18 percent of Lincoln County adults engage in “excessive drinking,” which is defined by the CDC as drinking 5 or more drinks on occasion for men or 4 or more drinks for women.”; and

WHEREAS, substance use disorders are a treatable, yet contribute to serious health care problem and our community must take steps to address it; and

WHEREAS, educating our community about how substance use disorders affect all people in the community, including public safety officials, the workforce, older adults, and families, therefore is essential to combat misconceptions associated with addiction; and

WHEREAS, to help more people enter a path of recovery, achieve long term recovery, and learn how recovery positively benefits well-being; the prevention coalitions of Lincoln County (PAADA & CEDARR) together with Celebrate Recovery Waldport, Siletz Tribe, Seashore Family Literacy Center, Lincoln County Health & Human Services,

and many local treatment and recovery support organizations, invite all residents of Lincoln County to participate in events to celebrate recovery and wellbriety during the Annual 2016, National Recovery month including:

- The 8th annual Hands Across the Bridge event, on Saturday, September 24, 2016 at 10:00 am in Waldport. (Assembly begins at the Alsea Bay Interpretive Center Parking Lot, 620 NW Spring Street, Waldport)
- A recovery/wellbriety celebration will follow the bridge event from 1:00-3:00 pm at the Seashore Family Literacy Center featuring live music, food, activities and much more.

NOW, THEREFORE, we, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, do hereby proclaim September 2016 as “National Recovery and Wellbriety Month” in Lincoln County and encourage citizens to celebrate recovery, spread the word and support these community efforts and events.







9 annexing almost all, but not all, of the properties within the REWD, and declaring the
10 withdrawal of such property from the District, effective July 1, 2013; and

11 WHEREAS, thereafter, REWD filed litigation in the Lincoln County Circuit Court and
12 initiated an appeal to LUBA in response to the annexation; and

13 WHEREAS, REWD subsequently resolved its legal issues (both in the Circuit Court and

22 WHEREAS, the remaining territory in the REWD following annexation is quite small;
23 currently there are only three houses within the District and only two electors, making the
24 District uninhabited within the meaning of ORS 198.705(19); and

25 WHEREAS, the REWD has not been active for more than two years, and as a matter of
26 housekeeping, it needs to be formally dissolved;

27 NOW, THEREFORE, THE LINCOLN COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS





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Place-Based Integrated Water Resources Planning

Helping Oregon communities plan for their current and future water needs.



Water is important to all Oregonians. It is vital to community well-being, economic development and a healthy environment. Across Oregon, every place has its unique water challenges that, if left unaddressed, may increase in the future. The 2012 Integrated Water Resources Strategy (IWRS) recommends that the Oregon Water Resources Department (OWRD) help communities collaboratively develop solutions to address water challenges within a watershed, basin or groundwater area. Place-based planning provides an opportunity for people with an interest in water to better understand local water resources and to coordinate efforts so that they are working towards a shared vision of their water future.

What is place-based planning?

Place-based planning provides a framework for communities to understand and meet their water needs now and into the future. Communities will accomplish this by:

1. Building a collaborative and inclusive process;
2. Gathering information to understand current water resources and identify gaps in knowledge;
3. Examining current and future water needs for people, the economy, and the environment;
4. Developing and prioritizing strategic and integrated solutions to meet water needs;
5. Creating a local integrated water resources plan.

Why place-based planning?

Place-based planning will help foster cooperative relationships between individuals and groups that value water differently. Through a collaborative process planning groups will build upon existing knowledge, identify and fill information gaps, coordinate efforts, and explore innovative solutions to meet multiple needs. Place-based planning can help communities develop a shared understanding and vision, prioritize actions, and gather the support and resources they need to implement those actions.

Key Planning Principles

- Locally-initiated and led collaborative process
- Voluntary, non-regulatory approach
- Includes a balanced representation of water interests
- Conducted in partnership with the state
- Addresses instream and out-of-stream needs
- Looks at water quantity, quality and ecosystem needs
- Open and transparent process that fosters public participation
- Builds on and integrates existing studies and plans
- Does not infringe on existing water rights
- Adheres to IWRS principles and state laws

Place-based planning pilot areas

In 2015, the Legislature provided OWRD with resources to pilot place-based planning, including funding to assist communities with planning through grants. After soliciting and evaluating 16 letters of interest from around the state, grants were awarded to organizations in four areas: the John Day Partnership in the Lower John Day Sub-Basin, Union County in the Upper Grande Ronde Sub-Basin, the Harney County Watershed Council in the Malheur Lake Basin, and the City of Newport in the Mid-Coast Basin.

During the pilot phase, each of these places will partner with the Department to test a set of [draft planning guidelines](#), identify best practices, and improve the process. The first step for the pilots is to bring together interested partners in a collaborative, locally-led process that is open to the public.

Mid-Coast Water Planning Partnership



The Mid-Coast Water Planning Partnership will examine water needs in Oregon's Mid-Coast region. Our regional water suppliers include small cities, unincorporated community water districts, tribal communities, and commercial industry near the Pacific Ocean. Our area is home to a vibrant fishing, tourist, and forest products economy, and an ecosystem that supports diverse populations of fish and wildlife. We will be working to develop regional solutions to provide adequate water supplies for water systems and local industry, while providing adequate flows and water quality for fish, wildlife, and our environment. *You are invited join the Partnership and be a part of this important conversation.*

Our water challenges

The need for reliable, quality water supplies is critical. The Mid-Coast Region has unique water challenges that, if left unaddressed, will intensify over time:

- Over the last few years some water suppliers have struggled to meet existing demands. A 2008 study found that, given current supplies and infrastructure, several water suppliers may be unable to meet demand by 2020.
- Low summer stream flow and limited water storage create pressures to meet the needs of communities for drinking water while maintaining stream flows critical for fish, recreation and industry.
- Many of our communities and their water systems are vulnerable to natural hazards, such as impacts of drought, earthquakes and tsunamis and are not prepared to respond to such events.

Defining our water future

These challenges require a coordinated approach since no one entity can address them alone. In June 2016, the City of Newport received a grant from the Oregon Water Resources Department (OWRD) to convene a collaborative, integrated water planning effort. This presents a timely opportunity to be proactive about understanding and meeting our current and future water needs.

Over the next three years, the Partnership will explore strategies to:

- Replace aging infrastructure, improve conservation, enhance regional water supply options, and more effectively share water.
- Relieve pressure on rivers, streams, and tributaries while meeting the water needs for coastal communities and industries.
- Create redundancies in our system so we are more resilient to drought, storms, and other natural vulnerabilities.
- Create a learning and action network for small water providers who are often most vulnerable to environmental and regulatory challenges.


A new approach

The Mid-Coast Region is one of four areas that is piloting a new approach to water planning with the Oregon Water Resources Department. This approach, which was recommended in Oregon's 2012 [Integrated Water Resources Strategy](#), encourages integrated planning at larger scales and gives communities a greater voice in determining their water future. During the pilot phase, local groups will partner with state agencies to test a set of [draft planning guidelines](#), identify best practices, and develop a plan for action. In addition to providing a road map for the Mid-Coast, our local plan will inform future updates to Oregon's statewide strategy. This is our opportunity to chart a new path forward for our community and the state.

The benefits of partnership

- Develop a common understanding of our water issues through discussion, sharing of knowledge, and examination of best practices.
- Coordinate current and future information gathering and data collection efforts.
- Develop a shared vision for our water future.
- Build cooperative relationships and foster networking among diverse water interests.
- Create a forum to explore innovative, out-of-the box solutions to collective problems.
- Coordinate and leverage local and statewide resources to achieve the best results for our region.




Integrated Water Resources Strategy


