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LPHA Governing Body Responsibilities

- Collaborate with the LPH administrator to develop public health policies and goals for the LPHA
- Adopt and enforce ordinances and/rules to administer public health functions, including adopting any penalties or fees
- Review and make recommendations on the local public health modernization plan
- Monitor the progress of the LPHA in meeting statewide and local public health goals, including public health modernization

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Local Public Health Authority Responsibilities

- Administer and enforce public health laws, including but not limited to:
 - Issuing isolation and quarantine orders
 - Receiving reports and investigating reportable communicable diseases and outbreaks
 - Review of immunization records and issuing exclusion orders
 - Licensure of tourist accommodations, camps, pools, spas, restaurants, etc.
 - Regulation of public water systems

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Local Public Health Authority Responsibilities

- Adopt and update public health modernization assessment
- Adopt and implement public health modernization plan (2023)
- Any other public health programs LPHA considers necessary to protect public health and safety
- Coordinate with Coordinated Care Organizations and Early Learning Hubs

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OHA Agreements with Lincoln County

- Intergovernmental Agreement for Financing of Public Health Services
 - Most funding from OHA for public health services
- Intergovernmental Agreement for Environmental Health Services
 - Food, pool, lodging, etc. inspections

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Triennial Review

- Based on Public Health and Environmental Intergovernmental Health Agreement between county and state.
- Ensure compliance with state and federal regulations and requirements related to public health funding
- 18 different areas reviewed
- December 2017 (On-site portion)
- Opportunity to identify areas for improvement and areas of strength

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Areas of Strength

- Experienced local public health administrator
 - Strong emphasis in quality improvement
 - Expanded Health Promotion department
 - Uses data to inform investments

- Strong regional partnerships
 - HIV Early Intervention
 - Public Health Modernization
 - Nurse Home Visiting
 - Prescription Drug Overdose Prevention

- Partnership with Intercommunity Health Network (CCO)

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Areas of Strength

- Babies First! And Perinatal
 - Collaborations with other agencies
 - Integration of Home Visiting and WIC

- Communicable Disease
 - In last three years, 444 CD reports and 24 outbreaks
 - Strong collaboration with environmental health

- Drinking Water
 - Responsible for 49 water systems
 - Competent, professional staff

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Areas of Strength

- Food, Pool, Lodging Health and Safety
 - 100% inspection completion rate once fully staffed
 - Good documentation, appropriate follow-up, well organized

- Health Officer
 - Dr. David Long
 - Strong communication between Health Officer and Health Administrator
 - Engaged especially in infectious disease and preparedness issues

Areas of Strength

- Emergency Preparedness
 - Integrated with County Emergency Management
 - Working on strengthening response capabilities, including staff and partner trainings
 - Collaboration across all levels of government and community

- Immunizations
 - Close relationships with private clinics, federally qualified health centers and other public health programs
 - Focus on improving kindergarten exemption rate which has resulted in steady decrease in these exemptions

Areas of Strength

- Nurse Family Partnership
 - Serves low-income women pregnant with first child
 - Since July 2012, served 230 clients
 - In last year, level staffing, but 30% increase in client visits
 - Serves double number of families expected by national standards, reached 82% of all county first births in 2016-17
- Reproductive Health
 - Six sites provide services
- Sexually Transmitted Diseases
 - Services available throughout county
 - Successfully controlled 2015 early syphilis outbreak
 - Strategic use of communications during the outbreak

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Areas of Strength

- Tobacco Prevention and Education
 - Use of no or low-cost media for prevention messages
 - Positive relationships with community leaders, organization and partners – enables leveraging of resources
 - Enhanced cessation screening, referrals, training, etc. to address tobacco addiction and treatment within health systems
- Vital Records
 - Orders completed within one day
 - Excellent service to customers and partners

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Areas of Strength

- WIC
 - Excellent customer service and strong teamwork, including cross-training model
 - Opened new satellite clinic in Waldport in 2017
 - Partnership with the Confederated Tribes of the Siletz Indians
 - Integration of Home Visiting and WIC
 - Partnerships with Advantage Dental – fluoride varnishes and oral care consultations at monthly WIC health fairs
 - Farm Direct Nutrition Program redemption rate was slightly higher than the state average and issue checks onsite at the local farmer's market

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Areas for Improvement

- Babies First! And Perinatal
 - Comply with Medicaid Targeted Case Management billing policies
 - Parents as Teachers clients and activities must be seen under oversight of RN case manager in order to bill for targeted case management
 - DUE DATE TO COMPLY: May 31, 2018
- Fiscal
 - Ensure accurate quarterly revenue and expense reports for all programs receiving federal and state funding are submitted to OHA
 - Base Family Planning charges and fees on cost analysis of services conducted every two years
 - DUE DATE TO COMPLY: April 23, 2018

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Areas for Improvement

- Immunizations
 - Submit vaccine orders according to tier assigned by OHA. RESOLVED: December 5, 2017
 - Work with birthing hospital when administration of Hepatitis B birth dose drops below 80%. DUE DATE TO COMPLY: May 5, 2018
 - Achieve vaccine accounting excellence in all LPHA-operated clinics. DUE DATE TO COMPLY: May 5, 2018
- Reproductive Health
 - Clinical services must follow national standard of care cited in clinical protocols
 - Adopt written plans for medical emergencies
 - DUE DATE TO COMPLY: March 14, 2018

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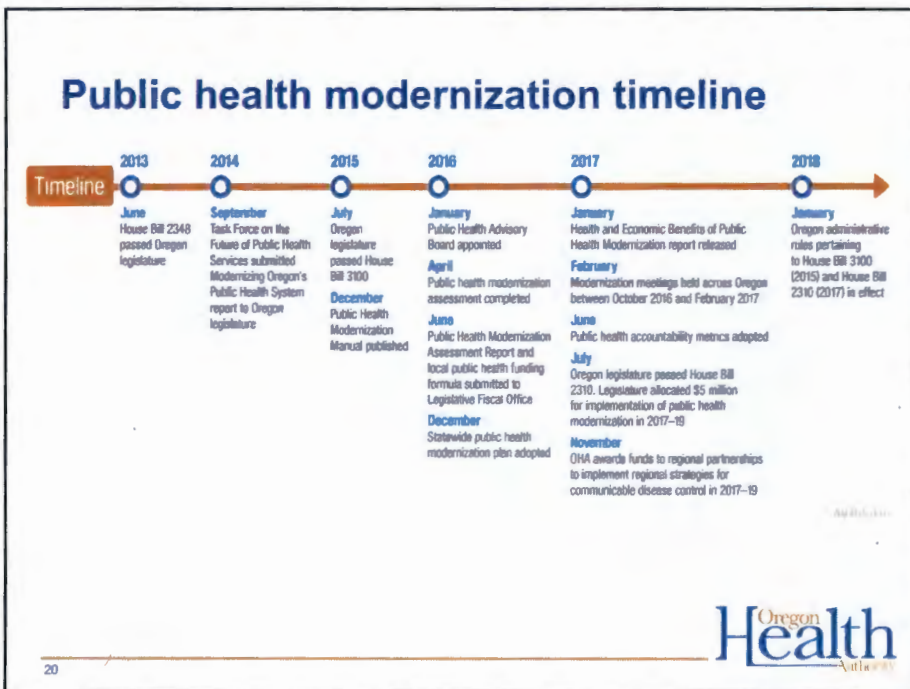
Areas for Improvement

- WIC – 2017 Review -- RESOLVED
 - Ensure registered dietitian is available to provide high risk participants needed services
 - Ensure program self-evaluation is completed in non-agency review years
 - Ensure "No Proof" forms are completed when eligibility pending
 - Ensure hemoglobin testing timeframes are met
 - Ensure high risk participants are referred to registered dietician
 - Ensure homeless facilities are informed of requirements for benefit use when WIC participants are in their facilities
 - Ensure all staff paid directly with WIC funds complete quarterly time study

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PUBLIC HEALTH MODERNIZATION

Public health modernization will ensure basic public protections critical to the health of all in Oregon and future generations – including clean air, safe food and water, health promotion and prevention of diseases, and responding to new health threats.



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What will be different?

Before modernization

- Significant gaps in public health capacity provided based on where you live
- Programs hindered by limited and inflexible funding
- Public health system designed to provide individual level services

After modernization

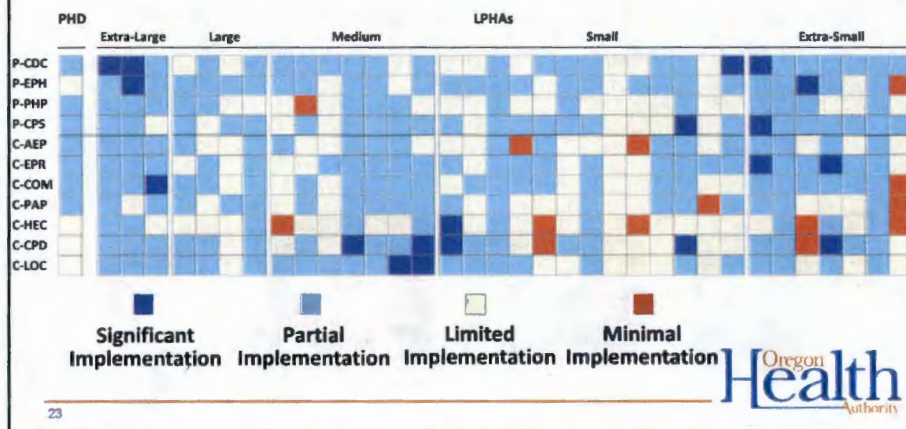
- Foundational level of service provided for everyone
- Programs supported by diverse funding sources that allow local needs to be met
- Public health is accountable for the health of the community

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Programmatic gaps in current governmental public health system

- These results show that implementation is uneven across the public health system.



Where are we now?

- Accountability metrics baseline data report
- Continued implementation with focus on communicable diseases for 2017-19
- \$5 million (~ 75% to LHDs through competitive funding)
 - Partnership with Lane, Benton, Lincoln, and Linn counties and Oregon State University
 - Learning laboratory to share information
 - Quality improvement – immunization rates
 - Hepatitis A vaccination among unhoused people
 - Academic Health Department model with OSU – extend capacity and support evaluation
