New Drive-Up Ballot Drop Boxes Now Available in Newport and Lincoln City

New drive-up ballot drop boxes are now available at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Newport and the Lincoln City City Hall in Lincoln City.

These drive-up ballot drop boxes will be available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week from April 28 through 8:00pm on May 16.

Newport:

Lincoln County Courthouse – located in rear parking lot at the east end of the second row of parking.

Go west on West Olive Street to 4-way stop by the jail.

Turn left onto SW Nye Street.

Turn left into second entrance to courthouse rear parking lot.

Go all the way to the end of the row and you will see the ballot box on the left side. (it is marked “Official Ballot Drop Site”).

Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!

Lincoln City:

Lincoln City City Hall – located in the lower parking lot under the City Hall.

Turn west at the stop light by the City Hall. (across from Burger King).

Enter the one-way entrance to the parking lot under the building.

The ballot box is near the elevators next to the water payment box and the book and video drops.

(it is marked “Official Ballot Drop Site”).

Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!

Ballot Title

21-106

FIVE-YEAR LOCAL OPTION TAX FOR DISTRICT INSTRUCTION AND OPERATIONS

Question: Shall the District levy \$0.89 per \$1000 of assessed value to support instruction and operations for five years beginning 2006-2007? This measure may cause property taxes to increase by more than three percent.

Summary: This measure may be passed only at an election with at least a 50 percent voter turnout.

This measure authorizes Lincoln County School District to levy a property tax in the amount of \$0.89 per \$1000 of assessed value each year for five years. The taxes imposed on some properties may be lower due to the amount of "gap" available between the Measure 5 and Measure 50 tax limits.

The tax revenues collected will be used to help finance school operations with:

- additional teachers and instructional staff
- additional funding for co-curricular staff
- instructional supplies and materials for the classroom

Local Option taxes will not be used for administration or central support expenses. Revenues collected will be budgeted and expended in a separate fund for clear accounting of their use.

An estimate of the total amount to be raised each fiscal year is:

2007-2008	\$4,305,000
2008-2009	\$4,434,000
2009-2010	\$4,567,000
2010-2011	\$4,704,000

The amount to be raised by this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of the estimate.

Lincoln County School District has been experiencing declining enrollment since 1995. The level of funding established by the State of Oregon has not stayed consistent with the cost of living increases experienced throughout Oregon. As the economy in the State fluctuates, so does the funding for K-12 education. As a result, Lincoln County School District has been forced to eliminate elementary and middle school counselors, media/librarian staff, increase student/teacher ratios, reduce the amount of elective course offerings at both middle and high schools. Music and PE instruction at elementary levels is at a minimum. Support staff at schools has been reduced drastically. Middle school sports have been eliminated, and the funding for high school athletics has been slashed to only support a portion of the total cost of the programs. Community and Booster organizations have been responsible for making up the difference to maintain sport activities in their high schools.

All revenue collected from the local option levy will go to improve and enhance the education of the students of Lincoln County.

Explanatory Statement

The Lincoln County School District is requesting voter approval of a five-year local option operating tax levy beginning in 2006-07.

The local option levy would provide the Lincoln County School District with approximately \$4,000,000 per year for instructional staff, supplies and materials for the classroom, additional funding for co-curricular staff as well as additional funding for Charter School students. Local option taxes will not be used for administration or central support expenses. Revenues collected will be budgeted and expended in a separate fund for clear accounting of their use.

The levy calls for a tax rate of \$.89 per \$1,000 be assessed against property values. This would be the maximum amount assessed against a property. Depending upon the "gap" of each individual property the amount collected could be less, and in some cases nothing/zero. The owner of a \$200,000 home would pay a maximum net increase in property taxes of \$14.84 per month or \$178.00 per year. OUR COMMUNITIES

Healthy schools and a healthy economy go hand in hand.

Our schools and the economic and social health of our communities cannot be separated. It is becoming increasingly more difficult to attract and retain the professional and skilled workers who provide essential healthcare, professional and business services to our region. Good schools make it easier to attract and keep these families.

Funds from the Local Option Levy go straight to the classroom. The Lincoln County School District Local Option Levy will provide approximately \$4 million, for each of the next 5 years that will directly benefit our students. Levy funds will NOT be used for facilities or administration. Depending on local priorities, levy dollars can be used to restore full-time Kindergarten; more Math, English, Science classes; expanded Art, Music, PE, and Drama; Business, Technology and School-to-Work; Alternative Education, as well as teaching assistants and family advocates. The levy will include partial restoration of high school athletic funding which will ease the current burden on our communities to keep these programs viable. The remaining funds will be used for supplies, equipment and extra-curricular support.

Accountability is guaranteed. Each school will submit proposals for the use of levy funds to the Superintendent and School District Budget Committee. The School Board, an elected body directly accountable to the voters, must give final approval. Revenue from the levy will be subjected to a separate accounting system within the school district budget so that it will be clear and easy to verify how funds are being used.

We must act now to make sure Lincoln County remains a good place to live, work, and raise a family. An increased level of local support and control will demonstrate the commitment of Lincoln County residents to an improved educational system that prepares our young people for further studies and the workforce.

Voting Information

Registering to Vote

To be eligible to vote in the May 16, 2006 Primary Election, a completed voter registration card must be postmarked by April 25, 2006.

To Register To Vote In Oregon, You Must Be:

1. A resident of Oregon.
2. A United States citizen.
3. At least 18 years old by election day.

You Must Update Your Registration If:

1. Your residence or mailing address changes.
2. Your name changes.
3. You wish to change your party affiliation.

Important Note: If you have moved or your name has changed and you have not yet updated your registration, you are still eligible to vote. Contact the Lincoln County Elections office, 541-265-4131 for further information.

Voters With Disabilities:

If you are unable to vote your ballot without assistance, contact the Lincoln County Elections office at 541-265-4131. We will provide two persons to assist you in voting. To assure your voted ballot is received by election day, contact the elections office early to arrange for assistance. You may also select someone else of your own choice to assist you.

Voting Instructions

Check Your Ballot!

To vote you must blacken the oval (●) completely with a pencil or pen (black or blue ink).

To write-in a name — Blacken the oval (●) to the left of the dotted line and write-in the name on the dotted line.

If you vote for more candidates than allowed, or if you vote **both Yes and No** on a measure, it is called an overvote.

Your vote **will not count** for that candidate or measure.

You do not have to vote on all contests. Those you do vote on will still be counted.

Contact Lincoln County Elections office at 541-265-4131 to request a replacement ballot if:

- you make a mistake
 - your ballot is damaged or spoiled
 - your ballot is lost
- or for any other reason.

After voting—SEAL the ballot in the ballot secrecy envelope.

SEAL your BALLOT (enclosed in the secrecy envelope), inside the return envelope, SIGN THE RETURN ENVELOPE in the space provided, and mail it in time to be received in the office of the County Clerk by May 16th, or drop it off at a designated drop site (see drop sites on the first page of this county voters' pamphlet).

REMEMBER!

All ballots must be voted and received at a drop site or the Lincoln County Clerk's Office by no later than 8:00 p.m., May 16, 2006.
