21-65 MERGES FIRE DISTRICTS IN WALDPOR AND TIDEWATER

QUESTION: Should the Central Oregon Coast Fire and Rescue District be merged with the Waldport-Tidewater Rural Fire Protection District?

SUMMARY: This measure may be passed only at an election with at least a 50 percent voter turnout.

Merges the Central Oregon Coast Fire and Rescue District and the Waldport-Tidewater Rural Fire Protection District. Central Oregon Coast Fire and Rescue District shall be the surviving district. Surviving district will encompass geographic boundaries of merging districts, and will assume all rights, powers, assets and liabilities of merging districts. New Board of Directors of surviving district will be comprised of five members and will be drawn from members of merging districts as provided by law. Merger will be effective upon passage of measure by the voters.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Recently, the directors of the Waldport/Tidewater Rural Fire Protection District, (WTRFPD), and the Central Oregon Coast Fire and Rescue District, (COCFRD), approved the filing of a ballot measure asking the voters of each district to approve a merger of the two districts. The voters of each district must approve this merger by a majority of the votes cast for it to be valid.

The surviving district would be the Central Oregon Coast Fire and Rescue District. Under a merger such as this, the limit of ad valorem property tax to be imposed by the merged district shall be the rate that would produce the same tax revenue as the local taxing districts would have cumulatively produced in the year of merger, if the merger had not occurred.

The two boards spent many months in consideration and discussion of this issue. We are in complete agreement that this course of action is in the best interests of the patrons of both districts.

In the face of ever increasing regulation, training, and record keeping requirements it has become nearly impossible to operate even a small fire department without some level of paid staffing. Over the past 40 years, volunteers from both districts have given countless hours in service to their friends and neighbors, but the world continues to grow ever more complicated. We are all faced with increasing demands on our time and giving up more time away from your family or job to satisfy the requirements of OSHA or some other regulatory body is no longer a reasonable request to make of volunteers.

By combining the two districts we can take advantage of the economies of scale and spread costs over a broader range of those who receive the services. It is our opinion that the combined rate will provide adequate resources to continue current operations and will allow for modest reserves for capital and equipment improvements. It is our intent to operate the combined district in the most fiscally sound fashion possible. You will not see a huge increase in hiring of personnel or lots of new gadgets.

In reality, the COCFRD has actually been providing the majority of the fire protection for both areas for some time now. Most of the members of the WTRFPD do not work in the Tidewater area so daytime calls can more quickly be handled by the Waldport Station. This means in that the taxpayers of the COCFRD have been subsidizing the cost of fire service in Tidewater and this merger will make this more equitable.

We have identified several short and long-term issues that need attention in both districts. We will prioritize these issues based not only on their financial impact on the district but also on input from the trained professionals we currently have on staff and input from the people of the district. 




