



<p>21-55 FIVE YEAR LOCAL OPTION TAX FOR THE YACHATS FIRE DISTRICT</p> <p>QUESTION: Shall the Yachats Rural Fire Protection District levy a property tax of 61 cents per \$1000 assessed value?</p> <p>This measure would impose a five year local option tax. This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.</p> <p>SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would subject tax assessable property in the Yachats Rural Fire Protection District to additional property taxation for five years in the amount of 61 cents per \$1000 assessed property value (tax years 1999-2000 through 2003-2004). It is estimated that this measure would raise approximately \$144,993 in tax revenues for 1999-2000, \$149,343 in tax revenues for 2000-2001, \$153,823 in tax revenues for 2001-2002, \$159,353 in tax revenues for 2002-2003, and \$163,191 in tax revenues for 2003-2004. Revenues would be used by the Yachats Rural Fire Protection District to fund district operations, expand training and small equipment purchases, make repairs to existing fire engines, and establish reserve funds for fire engine replacement.</p>	<p>21-61 REVISE CITY CHARTER TO ELECT COUNCILORS BY NUMBERED POSITIONS</p> <p>QUESTION: Should the city charter be changed to elect city councilors by numbered council positions?</p> <p>SUMMARY: This measure, if approved, would change the city charter, section 27, how councilors are elected from the present at-large method to elected by numbered council positions. With either election method the city council would consist of the mayor and six councilors. Three councilors are elected to four year terms every two years at the November general election. With the at-large method the three candidates who receive the highest vote total are elected. The numbered councilor positions method would number each of the six council seats and the candidate with the highest vote total for each specific numbered seat would be elected. Thus council candidates must choose (run for) a specific seat and the candidate with the highest vote total for each specific seat would be elected. If this measure is approved, the new election process would begin with the general election in November, 2000.</p>
<p>EXPLANATORY STATEMENT</p> <p>The Yachats Rural Fire Protection District is the governmental agency that supervises the Yachats Volunteer Fire Department. The Yachats Rural Fire Department services an area from just south of the Yachats city limits to the southern Waldport city limits. The Department is funded almost exclusively from property taxes paid by residents within the District. Over the past ten years, the cost to operate, to train our volunteers, and to buy equipment has increased much faster than revenue growth. For the past two years, the District has been able to operate at its current level only by spending money that had previously been saved to purchase new equipment. With the recent passage of Measures 47 and 50, the District suffered a loss of revenue for 1998-99 of about \$10,000, from about \$80,000 to about \$70,000. Also, new requirements will force the District to hire paid staff for training and safety.</p> <p>In addition to paying for daily operation expenses, the District must plan on replacing fire engines as they become uneconomical to repair, but today this money is being spent to pay bills. The District's fire engines are getting old, and must be replaced. The last engine bought new was in 1971. The rest of the engines were bought used, and the District plans on getting about 20 years of service from each of them. A good used fire engine today costs \$200,000-250,000, and with a current annual income of about \$70,000 the District cannot plan any replacements.</p> <p>The District's last tax increase was in 1975, 23 years ago. Since then the number of homes and businesses in the District increased dramatically, but under the old tax base system, the District received no additional funding. For property valued at \$100,000, the current tax rate of 28.96 cents per \$1000 means a tax of \$28.96 per year. A study of all 249 Rural Fire Protection Districts in Oregon found that the AVERAGE tax rate was \$1.3218 per \$1000. There are only three Districts in the state with a lower tax rate, and they are all very small, one engine operations.</p> <p>Measures 47/50 have made the District's tax rate permanent. The District Board of Directors conducted an extensive analysis of the District's financial requirements for the next five years and has concluded that we must ask the citizens to approve a five-year Local Option Tax in the amount of 61 cents per \$1000. This money will be used to continue to operate at our current level, pay for the training and small equipment our volunteers need, hire required staff, and put aside funds to replace old fire engines.</p> <p><i>(This information submitted by Edward T. Hallahan, Secretary/Treasurer, Yachats Rural Fire Protection District)</i></p>	<p>EXPLANATORY STATEMENT</p> <p>This measure, if approved, would change the Toledo City Charter, Section 27, how councilors are elected from the present at-large method to election by numbered council positions. The City Council consists of the mayor and six councilors. Three councilors are elected to four year terms every two years at the November general election.</p> <p>With the at-large method the three candidates who receive the highest vote total are elected. The numbered councilor positions method would number each of the six council seats. At every November general election each official position number shall be separately designated on the ballot. The council candidate must choose (run for) a specific numbered seat. An incumbent councilor may not file for nomination for or election to any councilor's position except the numbered position he or she presently fills. A candidate may not file for more than one numbered position in any one year, nor can a candidate file for another council position in the same year after withdrawing their original filing. The candidate with the highest vote total for each specific numbered seat would be elected.</p> <p>If this measure is approved the new election method would begin with the general election in November, 2000.</p> <p><i>(This information submitted by Jim Ruggeri, City Attorney)</i></p>

21-56 CITY OF NEWPORT GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND AUTHORIZATION

QUESTION: Shall the City issue general obligation bonds to finance wastewater system improvements in an amount not exceeding \$11,600,000? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of Section 11 or 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: If this measure is approved, it will finance a portion of the costs to:

- acquire land for, and construct and equip a new wastewater treatment plant;
- construct, repair and improve the existing wastewater system; and
- pay bond issuance costs.

Bonds will not exceed \$11,600,000 and will mature in not to exceed 20 years.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Newport's existing wastewater treatment plant was built in 1963. It was designed to treat approximately 1.6 million gallons of sewage per day and was intended to serve the City for 25 years. In 1984, the plant was expanded to its current treatment capacity of about 2.5 million gallons of sewage per day. Average wastewater flows now exceed this amount and are expected to keep pace with Newport's 2.2% annual growth rate. In the past five years, the existing plant has frequently been in violation of water quality standards established by the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). These violations often carry with them fines, which have been temporarily waived by the state pending construction of a new wastewater treatment plant. Oregon DEQ has mandated that a long-term solution be provided.

The proposed general obligation bond is for \$11.6 million and would result in a 20-year property tax increase of approximately \$1.85 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The entire cost of the new wastewater treatment facility is estimated at \$37 million and is anticipated to be distributed among a variety of residential, commercial and visitors' fees, taxes and funds on hand.

The major components of the project include the new wastewater treatment plant, new sewage pump stations at South Beach and Nye Beach, and new pipelines under Yaquina Bay to the new treatment plant. The new wastewater treatment plant is expected to accommodate future growth of the City into the years 2020-2025. The site of the new plant is projected to be large enough to accommodate additional growth to the year 2050.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

Built in 1962, the current waste water treatment plant is antiquated, overloaded and simply cannot cope with the current 1998 volume. The existing plant site space is very limited and can only provide treatment for the short term, even if it is rehabilitated.

The new proposed treatment plant would be located on forty acres in South Beach. This site would best meet criteria for zoning, sufficient space for long term planning and favorable topography and soil conditions with close proximity to land application sludge disposal site at the airport but, most importantly, it will allow for future growth into the next century. If Newport is expected to grow and flourish as a community, we need to address the most basic of our needs. Certainly a new treatment plant is at the top of the list!

Currently the City of Newport, under a interim permit, has been allowed by D.E.Q. time to correct the inadequate existing system. But, if this measure were to fail, the City of Newport will face the inevitable position of facing D.E.Q. discharge violations.

Please, join me in a yes vote for the Newport wastewater treatment plant.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

VOTE YES ON SEWER BONDS!

This November, Newport residents have a chance to vote YES for the future of the City. A modern sewer plant will be located near the airport, tucked safely away from residences and businesses. This plant will guarantee stable growth and uninterrupted service until far into the 21st century. Here are some good reasons to vote YES on sewer bonds:

1. The present plant is outmoded, overloaded, and located near businesses and residences.
2. The new plant in South Beach is well engineered and is better zoned than the present plant. There's no room for a plant north of the Bay.
3. Drilling under the Bay floor with pipes is safe and effective. So is using the ocean for effluent discharge. The Corps of Engineers and the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality prefer this method.
4. If we don't build this plant now, we'll have to upgrade an outdated plant now and upgrade it again soon.
5. The current plan to encase sewer pipes in rock under the beach is safer and affects fewer people than construction along Elizabeth Street, the major alternative. It affects only the beach South of Nye Creek (and only part of that area at any one time during one season). Beach access will be maintained at all times.
6. Bonds are only a third of the \$37 million total plant cost. (1) Urban renewal funds pay \$16 million; (2) system development charges (levied on developers), a 1% room tax increase, sewer hookup charge increases, and miscellaneous savings, pay \$9 million; and (3) the proposed 20 year general obligation bond measure pays the remaining \$12 million. By avoiding future inflation and with new assessed valuation reducing bond requirements, the plant will never be less expensive.
7. Bond costs are \$185 (tax deductible) a year on a \$100,000 house, and cost much less than financing sewer expansion with sewage fees (non tax deductible).

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

As your elected representatives to the Newport City Council, we ask you to vote **YES for Measure 21-56**. Making the best use of your City tax dollars to provide basic services is our most important task. We are required by a temporary DEQ permit to correct the current situation, regardless of the outcome of the vote. This measure will allow us to provide sewage treatment at the most affordable rates until 2025 and beyond. Careful planning for this complex project was done by a citizen committee and guided by qualified engineers. It is more costly to remodel our current facility than replace it, in order to comply with new environmental standards. The solution chosen makes the best sense for our pocket books and for the environment.

Many different funding sources are available. Here is a breakdown of the finances proposed for the Wastewater Treatment Plant Project:

\$16.5 million Urban Renewal Funds	No

Measure 21-56 represents 31% of the funding. The General Obligation Bonds will allow the construction to begin immediately, and spread the burden to all present and future taxpayers over the next twenty years. It will levy the least amount when compared to financing the project through increased fees and rates.

Estimated annual property tax increase:
\$1.85 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Annual increase for a \$90,000 home: 90 X \$1.85 =
\$166.50 per year.

Further delay will be very costly. The cost to comply with increasingly tougher water quality standards, costs of a no-growth economy, and construction costs will be much greater if we don't solve this problem now.

21-57 LOCAL OPTION TAX FOR LINCOLN COUNTY LIBRARY DISTRICT

QUESTION: Shall a local option tax of 12 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value for 5 years be approved?

This measure would impose a five year local option tax.

This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

SUMMARY: The Lincoln County Library District provides services to all unincorporated area residents of Lincoln County and residents of Depoe Bay, Siletz and Waldport. District residents have fee-free access to the libraries in Lincoln City, Newport, Siletz, Toledo and Waldport. Approval of this measure would fund additional library services. Approximately 2/3 of the revenue would be used to increase funding for these libraries. The remaining funds would be used for Library District programs that would include expanding the inter-library book loan program, increasing access to magazines and reference materials, and providing outreach services to homebound patrons and rural children.

The levy proposed is a local option tax of 12 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value.

It is estimated that this measure would raise approximately \$234,119 in tax revenues for 1999-2000, \$241,143 in tax revenues for 2000-2001, \$248,377 in tax revenues for 2001-2002, \$255,829 in tax revenues for 2002-2003, and \$263,503 in tax revenues for 2003-2004, for Library District services.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The Lincoln County Library District provides services to all unincorporated area residents of Lincoln County and residents of Depoe Bay, Siletz and Waldport. These services are paid for by a tax base of \$416,466 established in 1990. That tax base was converted under Ballot Measure 50 to a permanent tax rate of 24.65 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. Since that tax base/permanent rate was established 7 years ago, increased demands for library services require an increase in funding.

Approval of the measure would establish a 5 year local option tax of 12 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. The additional funds would increase support for existing libraries (which provide fee-free access to district residents), expand the book loaning program, increase access to magazines and reference materials, build library collections in rural areas, develop outreach services to homebound persons and rural children, and support other District programs. It is estimated that if the proposed rate were imposed in 1999/2000, it would raise \$234,119 for Library District services.

A special road district is governed by a board of three commissioners, each of whom must be an elector of the district. The members of the district board are appointed by the county board of commissioners.</p> <p>Approval of this measure would also approve a permanent tax rate limit for the district of 85 cents per \$1,000 assessed property value (which is \$85 per \$100,000 assessed property value). The proposed district would include all of N Deer Drive, all of N Alder Court, and nearly all parcels of property which abut either of those two public roads (including all of the Quail Run subdivision, nearly all of the Bear Creek Meadows subdivision, and a few lots within the Bear Valley subdivision).</p> <p>A special road district generally exists for the purpose of levying property taxes within its district boundaries and using those tax revenues for the purpose of maintaining public roads within the district's boundaries. A special road district is governed by a board of three commissioners, each of whom must be an elector of the district. The members of the district board are appointed by the county board of commissioners.</p> <p>Approval of this measure would also approve a permanent tax rate limit for the district of \$1.50 per \$1,000 assessed property value (which is \$150 per \$100,000 assessed property value). MEASURE NO. 21-60

21-60 BONDS TO ACQUIRE AND PRESERVE OPEN SPACE.

QUESTION: To preserve open space, protect forested areas, wildlife habitat, water quality, shall City issue \$3 million in general obligation bonds? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property and property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: Preserves specified open space in Lincoln City and the urban growth boundary. Approved bonds will:

- Preserve open space for future generations.
- Maintain water quality in lakes and streams.
- Protect and enhance wetlands.
- Enhance the City's scenic beauty.

Preserving open spaces provide a balance to development within the Lincoln City urban area.

Bond proceeds will be used to:

- Buy property, or rights, to keep land as open space.
- Pursue other ways, such as grants, to achieve the same purpose.
- Provide improvements, only if consistent with the primary purposes of preserving open space, for protecting water quality, preventing erosion, retaining forested areas, and providing wildlife habitat.
- Pay bond issuance, open space acquisition and related expenses.

Bond proceeds will not be used for operating expenses. Acquisitions will be only from willing sellers. The use of funds will be governed by the City Council's August 24, 1998 Policy Regarding Use of Bond Funds for Open Space Acquisition.

Bonds will mature in up to 20 years. Average estimated bond cost is 48 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value per year.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Estimates predict that Lincoln City could double in population by the year 2020. More homes and businesses will be built to serve this anticipated growth. The inclusion of seasonal residents and vacation renters can increase the City's current population to over 25,000.

Open spaces, also know as greenspaces, are critically important to the City's livability, to minimize flooding, to improve water quality of the City's rivers, lakes and streams, and to provide aesthetic beauty for the City's citizens and for future generations. As natural open spaces are lost, water quality is degraded.

- Retaining forested areas on slopes will minimize erosion that pollutes streams.
- Preserving wetlands and floodplains that hold runoff will allow plants and microorganisms to biologically filter pollutants.
- Protecting natural areas with riparian corridors and native vegetation along the corridors will improve water quality.

The primary purpose of this measure is to acquire lands to prevent undesirable development, deforestation and degradation of wildlife habitat and wetlands. As a secondary purpose, acquired land may be used for passive recreation activities such as nature walks, picnicking, bird watching, hiking, and educational opportunities. Improvements may include public trails, native gardens, interpretive displays, a nature center, and similar public facilities. Any secondary uses and improvements, however, will be permitted only if the use or improvement is consistent with the primary purpose of the measure.

The measure authorizes the City to sell \$3 million in general obligation bonds to carry out the purposes of the measure. The City will be able to use the bond funds in a number of ways to protect and preserve open space land. These include outright purchase of open space land by the City; purchase of limited interests in open space land, such as conservation easements, by the City; and pursuing other ways, such as grants, to preserve open space land. Any acquisition using bond funds will be only from willing sellers.

Bond funds will not be used for open space operating expenses. Either the City Parks and Recreation Department or private citizens and groups will need to maintain the open space.

The bonds will mature in up to 20 years. The bonds will be payable from property taxes. All of the bonds may be issued at one time. If so, the average estimated bond cost is 48 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value per year.

As the City continues to develop, this measure will allow the City to balance development by protecting, preserving, and providing active stewardship of natural areas, wetlands, forested areas, wildlife habitat, and other valuable open spaces.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

The Benefits of Preserving Open Space:

Part of what makes Lincoln City a desirable place to live is the fact that there are still within its urban boundaries areas of greenspace and undeveloped forested land. These lands enhance the beauty of the entire city, providing habitat for birds, small animals and deer. The trees improve air quality by absorbing carbon dioxide and other toxic substances generated by the constantly increasing traffic through the city.

Many of these parcels contain wetland areas which need protection and preservation by maintaining the forested areas surrounding them to prevent soil erosion and water pollution from housing development. The unique plant and animal species found only in wetland areas need to be preserved.

Some of the large undeveloped areas are served by very inadequate arterial streets and poor access to an already congested Hwy 101. Further development in these areas would degrade the quality of life for those living in these areas and add traffic at two lane sections of Hwy 101 already overloaded.

Many large undeveloped areas lie within the Devils Lake drainage area. Erosion and pollution from development are degrading the lake. Protecting these areas from development and deforestation would help preserve the lake, enhance water quality, reduce the inflow of sediment and pollutants into the lake and assure the future enjoyment of the lake by Lincoln City residents and visitors.

Passage of a bond measure to acquire and preserve open space would enable the city to preserve and protect the quality of life we now enjoy, not only for this generation but for generations to come.

The next few years will be critical for its citizens. The needs are obvious: managed growth that won't detract from the quality of life in Depoe Bay, improvements to streets, public buildings and the park, local law enforcement, a healthy economy, and long term planning for the future.


I see divisions developing among some of our citizens on how best to approach these problems. It is important that these divisions be healed. I will work to bring all sides together.

The self-appointed fellowship ought to let up on the town and allow her to rest awhile in order that it may reflect upon its own glorious past.



Requires metropolitan service districts to reimburse counties and cities for costs of mailing notice resulting from changes in district land use regulations. Prescribes form of each notice.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: State government expenditures are estimated to be \$2,040,000 annually in notice costs. Local government expenditures, including those of the Metropolitan Service District, are estimated to be \$1,547,000 a year.

This estimate is based on 7,000 land use actions per year, of which 3,900 would require some notice under this measure. Actual expenditures may vary based on such variables as the total number of land use actions, the number of actions included in each notice and the costs per notice.

**REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE
BY REFERENDUM PETITION**

**57 MAKES POSSESSION OF LIMITED
AMOUNT OF MARIJUANA CLASS C
MISDEMEANOR**

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote makes possession of less than one ounce of marijuana a Class C misdemeanor.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains statute making possession of less than one ounce of marijuana a violation.

SUMMARY: Under current Oregon law, possession of less than one ounce of marijuana is a violation, punishable by 500 to 1000 dollar fine; charges against first-time offenders may be dismissed upon completion of marijuana diversion agreement. Measure makes possession of less than one ounce of marijuana a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by up to 30 days imprisonment, plus 500 to 1000 dollar fine. Measure also makes failure to complete diversion agreement ground for six-month suspension of offender's driving privileges. Allocates \$600,000 for enforcement.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: Direct state expenditures for law enforcement, indigent defense, court operation, and jury payments are estimated at \$586,000 annually. A one-time cost of \$50,000 would be required for Driver and Motor Vehicle Services computer programming. State expenditures could increase or decrease depending on the number of cases prosecuted, the number of individuals entering diversion agreements, and the number of defendants eligible for court-appointed counsel.

Direct county expenditures for local jail beds are estimated at \$229,000 annually. Local expenditures could increase or decrease depending on the length of sentences imposed by the courts, population management decisions of jail commanders, and management of offenders on probation or post-release supervision.

State fine revenues are estimated to be reduced by \$638,000 annually.

Major assumptions for these estimates include:

- 6,000 arrests per year.
- 50 percent of arrests will be prosecuted as misdemeanors, 40 percent will be prosecuted as violations, and 10 percent will result in a diversion agreement.
- 50 percent of all arrests will result in an average of one day of county jail time.
- 54 percent of arrests prosecuted as violations and 40 percent of arrests prosecuted as misdemeanors will result in convictions.
- The minimum fine of \$500 will be assessed for all misdemeanor convictions and maximum fine of \$250 will be assessed for all violations convictions.
- 40 percent of fines assessed for misdemeanor convictions and 78 percent of fines assessed for violation convictions will be collected.

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LINCOLN COUNTY, OREGON — NOVEMBER 3, 1998**

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PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

58 REQUIRES ISSUING COPY OF ORIGINAL OREGON BIRTH CERTIFICATE TO ADOPTEES

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote requires issuing copy of original Oregon birth certificate to adult adoptees upon request.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains confidentiality of original Oregon birth certificate of adoptees unless court orders disclosure.

SUMMARY: Current Oregon law provides that upon decree of adoption, a new birth certificate generally will be substituted for the original birth certificate, and the original certificate showing birth parent information will not be subject to inspection, unless a court orders disclosure. Measure would require state registrar to issue certified copy of original birth certificate to any Oregon born adopted person 21 years old or older. Establishes same procedures, filing fees and waiting periods for obtaining birth certificate copies for adopted persons as for non-adopted persons.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: No financial effect on state or local government expenditures or revenues.

59 AMENDS CONSTITUTION: PROHIBITS USING PUBLIC RESOURCES TO COLLECT MONEY FOR POLITICAL PURPOSES

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote prohibits using public resources to collect or help collect political funds.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote rejects prohibition on using public resources to collect or help collect political funds.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. Prohibits using "public funds" to collect or assist in collecting "political funds." "Public funds" defined to include public employee time, public property or equipment and supplies. "Political funds" defined to include any expenditure supporting or opposing a candidate, ballot measure or initiative petition. Prohibition applies even if public entities are reimbursed for use of public funds for collection. Measure would prohibit public employee payroll deduction for any entity that uses any funds deducted for political purposes or that commingles political and non-political funds.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: This measure is estimated to reduce state expenditures for voters' pamphlet publication by \$1,800,000 in the year 2000 and in subsequent even-numbered years. State revenues from filing fees are estimated to decrease by \$400,000 in the year 2000 and in subsequent even-numbered years.

These reductions result from eliminating candidates' statements and measure arguments in the State Voters' Pamphlet.

The measure will have no financial effect on local government expenditures or revenues.

60 REQUIRES VOTE BY MAIL IN BIENNIAL PRIMARY, GENERAL ELECTIONS

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote amends existing law to require vote by mail in biennial primary, general elections.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains current law prohibiting vote by mail in biennial primary or general elections.

SUMMARY: Current law prohibits vote by mail for biennial primary or general elections. This proposal eliminates the prohibition and requires vote by mail for biennial primary or general elections. The proposal does not affect existing law permitting the Secretary of State and county clerk to conduct other elections either at the polls or by mail.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: County government expenditures are estimated to be reduced each Primary and General Election year by \$3,021,709.

61 CHANGES MINIMUM SENTENCES FOR LISTED CRIMES, INCLUDING CERTAIN REPEAT OFFENSES

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote changes minimum sentences for listed crimes, including certain repeat offenses.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains present sentencing statutes and guidelines for listed crimes, including repeat offenses.

SUMMARY: Establishes minimum sentences for crimes listed as "major crimes." Provides one to three year proportionally increased sentences for major crimes, aggravated murder or murder if person has one to three prior convictions for major crime within past 10 years. Prior juvenile court adjudications involving major crimes apply to increase sentence. Treats prior conviction for driving under influence of intoxicants as major crime if current conviction is for criminally negligent homicide using vehicle. Prohibits temporary leave or other reduction in additional prison time imposed under measure.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: The mandatory and presumptive sentences imposed under this measure are estimated to require 4,300 new prison beds by 2006, with direct state expenditures for prison construction and start-up of \$470 million by 2006.

Direct state expenditures for prison operating costs and debt service are estimated at \$21 million in 1999-2000 and \$40 million in 2000-2001, growing to \$125 million in 2005-2006. Community corrections payments from the state to counties for probation and post-prison supervision are estimated to be reduced by \$800,000 in 1999-2000, \$1.9 million in 2000-2001, and \$1.4 million in 2005-2006.

Under this measure, direct state expenditures for court operations are estimated at \$100,000 in 1998-1999 and \$175,000 in each of the next two years. State expenditures for indigent defense are estimated at \$350,000 in 1998-1999 and \$900,000 in each of the next two years.

Major factors affecting this estimate include:

- Plea bargaining practices of prosecuting attorneys;
- Prior criminal history of offenders;
- Sentencing practices of judges;
- Numbers of arrests; and
- Type of prison bed, minimum or medium security.

62 AMENDS CONSTITUTION: REQUIRES CAMPAIGN FINANCE DISCLOSURES; REGULATES SIGNATURE GATHERING; GUARANTEES CONTRIBUTION METHODS

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote requires additional campaign finance disclosures; regulates signature gathering; guarantees certain contribution methods.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote rejects requiring additional campaign finance disclosures, regulating signature gathering, guaranteeing certain contribution methods.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. Existing statutes require disclosing certain campaign finances. Measure adds constitutional requirements for prompter disclosure of contributions \$500 or more; more frequent disclosure of contributions/expenditures for referendum/initiative petitions. Requires disclosing entity authorizing/paying for political advertising. Legislature may regulate, prohibit paying signature gatherers if it finds practice has caused fraud, other abuses. Guarantees individuals' right to make campaign contributions using certain methods. Secretary of State must promptly publish finance reports. Prohibits payments for signing/not signing petitions. Specifies penalties. Other provisions.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: This measure is estimated to increase state expenditures by \$248,000 a year, with an additional one-time-only start up cost to the state of \$104,000. Expenditures by county and city elections filing officers cannot be calculated, due to insufficient data.

63 AMENDS CONSTITUTION: MEASURES PROPOSING SUPERMAJORITY VOTING REQUIREMENTS REQUIRE SAME SUPERMAJORITY FOR PASSAGE

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote allows passage of greater-than-majority voting requirements only by equally large majority.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote allows simple majority to pass measures that impose greater-than-majority voting requirements.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. Measures including a requirement for more than a majority of votes cast by the electorate to approve any change in law or government action would become effective only if approved by at least the same percentage of voters specified in that proposed voting requirement. For example, a measure imposing a 2/3 majority voting requirement to change law would require a 2/3 majority to pass. Applies to initiated, referred measures presented to voters on or after November 3, 1998, including measures on same ballot.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: No financial effect on state or local government expenditures or revenues.

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**64 PROHIBITS MANY PRESENT
TIMBER HARVEST PRACTICES,
IMPOSES MORE RESTRICTIVE
REGULATIONS**

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote adopts restrictions on timber harvest practices, including federal regulation, allows citizen-suit enforcement.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains current regulations concerning timber harvest practices.

SUMMARY: Prohibits many present timber harvest practices, chemical herbicides, pesticides in forest. Limits size of trees that can be harvested. Covers private, state, federal forestlands. Imposes new harvest regulations including federal regulation by classifying forestland waters as "navigable." State Board of Forestry must adopt new timber harvest methods and regulations to meet new requirements. Requires state to submit new forestland water quality plan to federal Environmental Protection Agency, seek approval before permitting logging. Authorizes citizens suits to enforce new harvest restrictions or other provisions of measure.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: State revenues are estimated to decrease \$25,000,000 per year. This estimate assumes a 60% harvest reduction in western Oregon and a 65% harvest reduction in eastern Oregon. These estimated decreases apply to private, local and state lands.

Current state expenditures are estimated to decrease by \$25,000,000 because of the revenue loss. Major annual state expenditure reductions would occur in forest management, fire protection, and regulation, timber tax revenue and administration, and Common School Fund forest land management.

Also, added regulations required by this measure would increase the need for ongoing state government expenditures above current requirements by \$5,000,000 per year. One-time state expenditures of \$1,400,000 would be required.

Revenues to schools are estimated to decrease by \$33,200,000 a year. County and special district revenues are estimated to decrease by \$7,800,000 per year.

Revenues that contribute to the Common School Fund will be reduced by \$8,700,000 primarily due to an estimated 84% decrease in harvest on Common School Fund Trust lands. This, in turn, will mean reduced earnings on the Common School Fund principal for distribution to schools.

**65 AMENDS CONSTITUTION: CREATES
PROCESS FOR REQUIRING
LEGISLATURE TO REVIEW ADMINISTRATIVE
RULES**

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote creates process for petitioning legislature to require its review of administrative rules.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote keeps system not requiring legislative approval for administrative rules to remain in effect.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. Current law does not require legislative review of administrative rules. Measure allows voters to require legislative review of administrative rules at next regular session when petition, signed by specified number of voters, is filed listing affected rules. Rule remains effective until reviewed by legislature, but rule ceases to be in effect unless approved. If governor vetoes bill, rule is disapproved unless legislature overrides veto. If rule is not approved, state agency may adopt new rule on same issue, but legislative review is required.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: No financial effect on state or local government expenditures or revenues.

**66 AMENDS CONSTITUTION:
DEDICATES SOME LOTTERY
FUNDING TO PARKS, BEACHES; HABITAT,
WATERSHED PROTECTION**

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote dedicates 15 percent lottery funding to parks, beaches; salmon, wildlife habitat, watershed protection.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains system restricting state lottery funding to job creation, economic development, public education.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. State lottery proceeds currently limited to job creation, economic development, public education. Measure dedicates 15 percent of net lottery proceeds to new fund for parks, beaches; salmon, wildlife habitat, watershed protection. Dedicates half of fund to create, maintain state parks, ocean shores, public beach access areas, historic sites, recreation areas. Dedicates other half for single agency to administer funds to protect native salmon, wildlife habitat, watersheds, using at least 65 percent for capital expenditures. Requires biennial audits, voter renewal in 2014. Other provisions.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: An estimated \$46.2 million of state lottery proceeds will be directed each year to parks and natural resources until the year 2014, when there is an automatic revote. Currently the Oregon legislature allocates those funds to a variety of programs including, but not limited to, education, economic and community development, natural resources and transportation. This estimate is based on 1999-2001 projections of lottery proceeds.

**67 ALLOWS MEDICAL USE OF
MARIJUANA WITHIN LIMITS;
ESTABLISHES PERMIT SYSTEM**

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote allows medical use of marijuana within specified limits; establishes state-controlled permit system.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains Oregon criminal, civil forfeiture laws prohibiting possession, delivery and production of marijuana.

SUMMARY: Oregon statutes currently prohibit possession, delivery, production of marijuana. Measure allows engaging in, assisting medical use of marijuana, within specified limits.

Requires medical use be necessary to mitigate symptoms, effects of debilitating medical condition, including cancer, glaucoma, AIDS, HIV, multiple sclerosis, others. Establishes state permit system requiring physician's written proof. Within specified limitations, exempts permit holder or applicant from marijuana criminal statutes; authorizes criminal charge defense for medical use without permit.

Limits amounts of usable marijuana, number of plants that may be possessed. Other provisions.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: Direct annual state expenditures are estimated at \$147,000, based on the assumption that 500 applicants will register with the Oregon Health Division per year. Some or all of these costs may be offset by fees to be established by the Health Division as provided in the measure.


